	Unneeded medicines left in our homes can be a danger to children and to potential abusers who may enter our homes throughout the year. Placing prescription bottles in garbage bags is not a guarantee that they will be
	handled properly and will make it to a landfill. Flushing drugs into the sewer system creates potential problems downstream, since municipal

<ul> <li>water systems are not designed to remove many of the compounds found in medicines. The safest way to dispose of prescription medicines is to take them to a nearby drug drop box found in the link above.</li> <li>With the end of the school year nearing, now is a perfect time to inspect your prescription and non-prescription pill inventory and to safely dispose of any items that are out of date or that you no longer need.</li> <li><i>Drugs aren't the only hazard potentials around your house.</i></li> <li>Herbicides, pesticides and cleaning supplies can also be a hazard to children and pets. Make sure to read your labels. If you see these words – Dangerl Poisonl Caution! Warning! – follow their safe use instructions and keep them away from children and pets.</li> <li>Pesticide chemicals pose an additional hazard – to your pollinators! This group includes certain insects and birds, but especially bees, wasps and hummingbirds in Arkansas. Without them we would have no fruits and vegetables, and their numbers are dropping. ## When cleaning out your classroom at the end of the school term

...don't forget to recycle those papers, magazines, catalogs, etc. left behind by your students or from cleaning out your files. Most all paper that comes across your desk is recyclable. Exceptions are construction paper, multi-media art projects, and dark color file folders (dyed through and through). Manila folders and envelopes are fine – even the window envelopes. Paper clips and staples are not a problem either. Many recycling programs will take soft bound books and some will take hard bound books. If your school has recycling bins in each classroom, please make sure your maintenance and janitorial folks know to collect and save them for the fall semester. Experience has shown that they tend to disappear during the summer months.

## Share this with your administrators and summer managers.

During the summer school campuses get overloaded with boxes of materials and equipment in preparation for the fall semester. Don't pay your trash service to take those boxes to the landfill, and burning them is a violation of Arkansas law! Contact your local recycling center and they will pick them up. Use the link above to find the center near you or give us a call at 870-793-5233 and we will help you find the nearest cardboard recycling service.

If you are updating your computer lab or need to dispose of outdated electronics, we can provide an on-site enclosed trailer to take school electronic waste. All of the electronic waste our program manages is shipped to the UNICOR Recycling Group in Texarkana, Texas. Materials are recycled in an information secure manner and metals, plastics and even leaded glass are tracked to their final destination.
